New Measures

- On Tuesday, it was announced the border closure would continue to be in place for another 30 days in an agreement between Canada and the United States.
- The province is now allowing **outdoor** gatherings of 50 or more, provided that 2m physical distancing can be followed, and people are not sharing food or drinks.
 - Indoor gatherings are still limited to no more than 15 people.
- A fire ban continues to be in place for provincial parks and protected areas and on public land. Alberta says this will allow emergency resources to remain focused on COVID-19, and not putting out human-caused wildfires and supporting community evacuations.
- Provincial campgrounds remain closed, but day use in provincial parks is permitted. Alberta will reopen campgrounds with limited capacity on June 1.
- Some national parks will also be reopening June 1, with physical distancing measures in effect.

- Minister Miller confirmed Canada will not ban Sundances or other spiritual ceremonies during the pandemic.

National and Regional Updates

- Canada Emergency Student Benefit applications opened <u>On Friday</u>. Students who
 have not filed taxes will have to contact CRA to register their Social Insurance
 Number.
- The Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy has been extended through the summer to give businesses the confidence to rehire and even grow their businesses during this time.
- Alberta is asking businesses to post a short survey about the steps they are taking to
 reduce risk of exposure to the coronavirus within 14 days of reopening. The survey is
 up on the <u>Bizconnect website</u> that the province launched last week to help businesses
 learn about the public health measures they need to have in place before reopening.
- Seniors will receive a one-time boost to Old Age Security and Guaranteed Income Supplement payments to a maximum of \$500 to deal with the added pressures and costs of COVID-19.
- Canada created a web portal to help businesses find a wide range of COVID-19 support and other programs and services. <u>Click here</u> for the new tool.

CALL & MEETING SUMMARIES

May 19 | Weekly Chiefs Committee on Health Meeting (CCOH)

The AFN Chiefs Committee on Health (CCoH) met with the First Nations Health Managers Association (FNHMA) today, who presented on their InfoPoint line mentioned above. ISC Assistant Deputy Minister Valerie Gideon, Dr. Tom Wong and Dr. Evan Adams shared their weekly updates and further reviewed considerations on lifting public health restrictions. **Their presentation is attached, including a detailed table with guidance on reopening in the last slides.**

Key Highlights:

- The First Nations Health Managers Association created "InfoPoint" -- a telephone line and email for First Nations that will search for credible and reliable information about their specific COVID-19 questions.

 People are available to respond Monday to Friday from 6 am to 6 pm MT.
- A First Nations-Inuit-Metis Alliance has been struck to do COVID-19 tracking and modelling work
- Val highlighted a "first-of-its-kind" agreement between the Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs and the province to track and share COVID-19 data.
 - Manitoba started asking patients testing positive for COVID-19 to voluntarily self-identify if they are First Nations, Métis or Inuit starting on April 3.
 - The data will be shared with First Nations leadership in the province.

- ISC reviewed in detail some of the general criteria First Nations leadership could consider in assessing their readiness for reopening different sectors of their community. This is detailed in the last slides of their presentation to the CCoH.
- Responding to a question raised by Chief Irvin Bull, the Alberta representative on the CCoH, about whether ISC will still fund security costs associated with reducing non-essential travel in light of province's beginning to reopen, Val clarified that these kinds of measures are still considered a public health expense, and will be funded.
 - ISC plans to re-issue its <u>COVID-19 funding guidelines</u> to respond to changes that have happened since March, and to clarify concerns that have come up around funding.
 - Val stressed they do not want to put communities in a place where leaders have to lift certain restrictions or measures because of money, and want to ensure communities are properly supported to maintain measures they determine are needed to uphold community safety.
- There was notable discussion about how First Nation communities should be proceeding with funerals and ceremonies.
 - Dr. Yacoub shared a best practice. There was a "drive through" funeral organized somewhere in Alberta where cars parked outside the funeral home, and only close family participated in the funeral inside. This was a collaborative effort between the funeral home, community leadership, and the RCMP.
 - It's clear that communities and leaders are looking for some guidance on how to balance the need for people to congregate when there is loss, with enforcing reasonable measures to keep community members, especially Elders safe.
 - ISC re-iterated they are not going to be getting in the way of communities practicing their ceremonies and protocol, which are necessary for community governance and life.
 - Some are calling for the AFN or another organization to begin providing some clear guidance on how to proceed with ceremonies safely.

Canada's COVID-19 Update - May 20

Speaking from outside his Ottawa residence, Prime Minister Trudeau made additional announcements on the Federal government response to COVID-19. Following this, Dr. Tam and Dr. Njoo gave their daily COVID-19 statistical updates. **Key Highlights:**

- There are now 79,491 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Canada including 5,955 deaths. 40,342 (51%) have now recovered. On testing, over 1,372,000 individuals have been tested with about 5% returning positive, for an average of 28,000 people a day.
- Canada Emergency Commercial Rent Assistance (CECRA) forgivable loans to landlords so they can reduce their rent by 75% for small businesses tenants that have lost majority of their revenue due to COVID-19. Cmhc.ca for details when application portal launches May 25.
 - Provinces and Territories will cover 50% in partnership with the Federal government. Landlords are asked to cover the other 25%. Tenants are asked to use the support they have such as the Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA) to cover the outstanding 25% not covered by CECRA.
- There will be a one-time \$300 bump-up to the Canada Child Benefit provided through CRA this month.

 Large employer emergency financing facility applications are open today, in order to provide bridge loans for the country's largest employers. Delivered through the Canada Investment Development Corporation.

RECAP Alberta's COVID-19 Update - May 19

(Alberta is transitioning to updates every other day going forward)

Minister of Health - Tyler Shandro, Minister of Seniors and Housing - Josephine Pon, Chair of the Alberta Continuing Care Association - Jennifer McCue, and Chief Medical Officer for the Province of Alberta Dr.Deena Hinshaw gave today's provincial update on COVID-19. **Key Highlights:**

- There are 1,004 active cases in the province, 61 hospitalized with 8 of these in ICU. Out of 2,428 new tests in the last 24 hours, there are 33 new cases.
- In a new major funding announcement to protect Albertans in continuing care, long term care, and other seniors care, Minister Shandro announced funding of over \$14 million/month for facility operations.
 - Funding is retroactive to March 15, to cover enhanced staffing, costs for cleaning supplies, and loss of accommodation revenue.
 - Funding to remain in place until all public health orders are lifted in Alberta.
 - Funding is in addition to other previously announced funding.
- Minister Pon also announced funding of \$2.9 million/month for seniors lodge operators to meet the needs of these facilities in response to COVID-19.

Additional Information:

- Working remotely where possible is still recommended until Stage 2 of the Alberta relaunch.
- Altered requirement for opening businesses: the COVID-19 measures template through Alberta BizConnect is recommended for businesses opening but is no

longer a mandatory requirement. This change was made based upon stakeholder feedback received over the weekend.
